

Enfield looks to the future

The penultimate stage in the production of the Enfield Plan which will guide the development of the Borough over the next 15-20 years was the publishing of the proposed submission stage for the Core Strategy in December. It can be viewed or downloaded from the Council's website at www.enfield.gov.uk/ldf>.

The consultation period finished at the end of January. The Enfield Society has submitted comments during the long gestation process. Of particular interest to us are Section 8, with Core Policies for Environmental Protection and Infrastructure and, in Section 9, Core Policies 42 and 43 relating to Enfield Town. Incorporating the work done on the Borough Characterisation Study, the Council's Heritage Strategy strikes a generally positive and welcome note.

Continuing concern over our museum

In our Autumn TES News we expressed our concern that the Museum and Museum Service might not be rehoused on the 1st Floor of Thomas Hardy House, which we considered to be the ideal location, alongside the Local History Unit. Our concern was shared by the Enfield Archaeological Society and we both informed the Council of our strongly held views, and we had hoped to be consulted on this before a final decision was made. However the Council has now decided that there will be a museum presence on the ground floor only at Thomas Hardy House. We will reserve judgement on this until it is officially opened and we can see exactly what there is there.

Conservation

As its contribution to Enfield Council's Benchmarking Project to be carried out by the local area study groups, the Enfield Society has completed a survey of the Turkey Street Conservation Area, which has no local group of its own. The overall aim is to produce an up to date photographic record of all the properties in our conservation areas as of 2009, quite an exhaustive exercise and now almost complete. This should be invaluable in assessing future development proposals.

The Council's Conservation Advisory Group (CAG) is worried that the latest, non-material changes to the Tottenham Hotspur Football Club development off Whitewebbs Lane are more extensive than seemed at first and deserve careful scrutiny. These include incorporating a strip of land originally behind the properties along Bulls Cross within the site boundary.

In the same general area the CAG, following a presentation by Capel Manor about their masterplan for the College site, was not altogether clear about what is intended and when. We hope a site visit arranged for later this month will clarify matters.

The upgrading of the Central Library in Cecil Road is nearing its conclusion. We understand that the carving on the stone frontage is to be carried out in situ by the long established firm of Rattee and Kett of Cambridge. Unwelcome though not unexpected is the application to fell and replace the large oak tree on the west side of the Library. This has been in decline for many years and it would be unrealistic not to agree with the proposal.

Annual General Meeting for 2010

Edmonton Group

The Enfield Society has funded the planting of six heavy standard field maple trees to provide some shade in the children's play area at Montagu Recreation Ground. We are considering funding more trees if Craig Park is upgraded as part of the improvements to the Youth Centre there which has recently received a grant of £3 million from the Government. The Society also supported the successful application by the Edmonton-based Art Start to the Heritage Lottery Fund for a grant to create mosaics around the Borough on the sites of former cinemas, theatres and music halls. We made a contribution towards the cost of replacing the missing plaque on Gladys Aylward's house in Edmonton.

The Group was represented at the renaming of a road near Jubilee Park in memory of Councillor Chris Andrew, who was a member of the Edmonton Group from the group's inception until his untimely death at the end of 2008 at the age of 31.

All are welcome at the Joint Meeting with the Edmonton Hundred Historical Society on Friday 26 February at the Charity School Hall, Church Street, Edmonton. Doors open 7.30 for an 8 pm start. The talk will be about the poet, John Keats, who went to school in Enfield and spent part of his short life in Edmonton.

London Forum

The London Forum of Amenity and Civic Societies has just celebrated its 21st birthday. Enfield Preservation Society was a founder member and there is now a membership of about 130. Its main aim is to help civic societies, residents' associations and other community groups to work together to protect and improve the quality of life in London. Its current concerns include the replacement of PPGs (Planning Policy Guidance *Notes*) with much less firm and specific Planning Policy Statements and the failure to protect World Heritage sites such as Westminster and Greenwich. Many societies suffer the same difficulties as we do and I certainly had "a fellow feeling" for the Tottenham Society which gave a presentation on its current problems with Spurs.

Every two years the London Forum invites member organisations to enter the Walter Bor Media Awards competition. There are four categories:

- *1. Newsletters TES News* received a Highly Commended this time so congratulations to our Editor, Leonard Will, and all contributors.
- 2. Printed publications we had nothing new to enter this but have twice won this category, with Fighting for the Future and Treasures of Enfield, while Heritage Walks was highly commended on the previous occasion.

Trees Group

Progress with planting out the Tree Nursery has been halted by the cold spell after a successful session in November saw a number of saplings planted. Weed control membrane is so far proving effective. Advice from Enfield Council Parks Outreach Officer is that we should be aiming to produce hedgerow species such as wild service tree and hawthorn, also hornbeam and black poplar.

At our December meeting we decided to compile a list of prominent trees growing on private land with a view to checking whether they are covered by Tree Preservation Orders. As I reported last time, there is no data base of TPOs currently available to public inspection. We would be glad to add any suggestions to our list. Trees on public land are not deemed to require protection.

Planning Inspectors are finding the Plan no longer relevant when determining planning appeals. The effort that has gone into formulating the new Plan seems to have been to good effect. Let us hope that future experience bears this out

At its last meeting the Society's Management Committee was also looking to the future. Our website at <www.enfieldsociety.org.uk> has been operational for a number of years thanks to the efforts of Leonard Will. It is particularly useful as a repository of information about our publications and recent newsletters. The Committee felt that more about the regular activities of the groups should certainly be included. The question arises as to whether a more interactive, day to

day approach is now needed, in line with current trends.

We do have an on-line discussion list, on Yahoo! Historic buildings

Arnos Grove, Cannon Hill, Southgate



1. Arnos Grove (left), previously Arno's Grove, was built between 1719 and 1723 for James Colebrooke, a London banker and mercer, possibly to a design by William Talman. The present portico is 20th century.



2. In 1723 scenes of *The Genius and Triumph of Julius Caesar* were painted on the entrance hall walls by the Flemish artist, Gerard Lanscroon. He was also responsible for the murals at nearby Broomfield House, which was badly damaged by fire in 1984.



Julius Caesar is sitting on a cloud holding a lyre and surrounded by the nine muses.



4. The Apotheosis of Julius Caesar with Jupiter and Juno is illustrated on the ceiling.

Historic Buildings Group Meetings and visits

Following Graham Dalling's interesting talk on 3rd December, we will be able to see some of the historic buildings in Islington on a walk he will lead in June. Details will be set out in the summer TES newsletter.

The next meeting of the Historic Buildings Group will be held in Jubilee Hall at 8 p.m. on **Thursday 25th February**. All members of the Society are invited to hear Graham advise on the dos and don'ts of architectural photography. We will also consider how members can help to protect Enfield's architectural heritage from unsympathetic alteration and demolition.

Between 11 a.m. and 2 p.m. on **Saturday 17th April** there will be several guided tours around two of Enfield's finest Victorian gothic revival churches. St. Mary Magdalene Church of 1883 by William Butterfield (listed Grade B, equivalent to II*) lies at the junction of the Ridgeway with Windmill Hill. The chancel has attractive coloured marbles and tiles, and roof and wall paintings. Tours will provide opportunities for the agile to ascend the tower. The adjoining Grade II listed former vicarage of 1883 is also by Butterfield.

The Grade II listed Christ Church United Reformed Church of 1874-5 (extended in 1885) by John Tarring is in Chase Side. It contains Victorian stained glass and a stone carved reredos of the Last Supper. There will be refreshments at Christ Church and historical displays and publications available at both churches.

5. In the 1780s Sir Robert Taylor was employed to extend the house with new wings and porticoes.



6. The drawing room was decorated by Sir Robert Taylor in the style of Robert Adam.



7. Arnos Grove in 1784. It was owned by members of the Walker family of Quaker brewers from 1777 to 1918. Isaac Walker made the nearby Walker Cricket Ground one of the principal cricket grounds in the country in the mid 19th century.



8. The entrance hall during the ownership, between 1918 and 1928, of Lord Inverforth, a wealthy shipowner.



9. Lord Inverforth's drawing room.



10. Lamps on the entrance driveway came from the 1924 British Empire Exhibition at Wembley.

In 1928, as Northmet House, Arnos Grove became the headquarters of the North Metropolitan Electric Power Supply Company and later, as Southgate House, offices for the Legal and General Insurance Company. It is now the Southgate Beaumont, a residential care centre run by Barchester Health Care. Extensions and alternations have been made by the various twentieth century owners.

The principal historic rooms of this Grade II* listed building are occasionally open by prior arrangement and may be seen on the Southgate Heritage Walk organised from time to time by The Enfield Society. Arnos Grove will be illustrated in *Discovering historic buildings in Edmonton, Winchmore Hill and Southgate*, at 10:30 a.m. on Tuesday 27th April in Jubilee Hall.

Reduced price train travel: Groupsave Off-Peak Day Return (previously Cheap Day Return) tickets allow 3 or 4 adults to travel together for the price of 2 adults on First Capital Connect, London Midland, Southeastern, Southern, Chiltern or National Express East Anglia. Even for travel to the start of linear walks Groupsave tickets are usually cheaper than buying a standard price single but you must travel as a group.

Please bring your Freedom Pass / National Bus Pass with you as we might use a bus for access.

Please wear walking boots or stout walking shoes – trainers are not usually suitable, even for London parks.

Sat 13 Feb. Regent's Canal and Little Venice. Meet 10.00am at entrance to platform 9, Kings Cross mainline station (9.29am train from Enfield Chase Station) for a linear walk beside the Regent's Canal, and including Camden Lock, Primrose Hill, Regents Park, ending at Little Venice by about 3.30pm. Many shorter options. Bring lunch or food available. Details: 07703 470 156. Leaders: Toby Simon and Margaret McAlpine

Mon 22 Feb. River and Common. Meet 11.00am Hammersmith Tube Station (Piccadilly and District Lines) by the entrance to Tesco Metro. Maximum 6 to 7 mile walk via River Thames path, nature reserve and Barnes Common although with shorter options. Finish by 4.00pm at a station. Bring lunch or food available. *Leader: Norman Coles*

Sat 27 Feb. Queen Hoo Hall and Manor. Meet 10.20am Watton-at-Stone Station (9.49am train from Enfield Chase Station or 10.07am from Hertford North Station) for about 7.5 mile linear walk to Hertford North via Bramfield Woods, Bramfield Village and Tewin. Bring lunch or pub food probably available. *Leader: Martin Langer*

Wed 10 March. Kenwood House. Meet 10.45am at front door to Kenwood House, Hampstead Lane, NW3, (210 bus from Finsbury Park Station) for about 2.5 to 2.75 hour circular walk across the Kenwood Estate and parts of Hampstead Heath. After walk: refreshment facilities available and/or be a tourist and view the splendid paintings and interior of the House itself. *Leader: Ken Cooper*

Sat 13 March. Enfield's Countryside. Meet 2.15pm at main entrance to Chase Farm Hospital on The Ridgeway for 3 to 3.5 hour walk using some of the rural field footpaths across the Enfield Chase farmland. The return to start may be by bus depending upon which paths are used. *Leader: Brian Frear*

Mon 22 March. Village London. Meet 10.49am Headstone Lane Station (10.17am London Overground train from Euston mainline station or travel with Stuart on the 9.34am train from Enfield Chase Station). About 6.5 mile

linear walk via Pinner and Eastcote Villages in this semi-rural part of north-west London exploring green spaces, woods and historic conservation areas with ancient buildings. The route ends at the astonishing Manor Farm heritage site in Ruislip with tithe barn, remains of motte and bailey castle and 16th century manor farmhouse. Return from nearby Ruislip Station. Shorter options. Bring lunch or food available. *Leader: Stuart Mills*

Sat 27 March. North of Hertford. Meet 10.38am Hertford North Station (10.19am train from Enfield Chase Station) for about 8 mile circular walk via Bengeo, Chapmore End hamlet, Tonwell Village (lunch stop) and the Beane Valley. Possible to end walk after about 4 miles in Tonwell and return to Hertford by bus. Bring food or pub food available. *Leader: Roy Nicholls*

Good Friday 2 April. Daffodil Display. Meet 2.30pm Oakwood Station (121 & 307 buses) for about 3 hour circular walk in Trent Park which we hope will coincide with the annual daffodil display. *Leader: Carol Cope*

Bank Holiday Mon 5 April. North East Hertfordshire. Meet 11.04am Royston Station or 11.15am at Royston bus station for car drivers. As you enter Royston from the south on the A10, the bus station is next to The Warren long-stay car park. By train either 9.49am from Enfield Chase, changing at Stevenage, or direct train at 10.11am from Finsbury Park or 10.21am from Potters Bar Stations. This 8.5 to 9 mile circular walk with long distance views will cover contrasting landscape scenery and villages. Lunch stop in Barley – pub food or bring lunch. Details: (020) 8360 0282. Leader: Roy Nicholls

Sat 10 April. Thames Chase & Warley Place. Either meet 11.03am at Harold Wood Station or by no later than 10.25am at Liverpool Street mainline station next to the entrance barrier to the departure platform (which usually is 11-14) for the 10.30am Shenfield train. The train frequency to Harold Wood is every 10 minutes. Please note the possibility of engineering work disruption on Enfield Town line. If so, Dave will travel on the 9.29am train from Enfield Chase, changing at King's Cross for Liverpool Street. By car: M25 to junction 28, A12 towards Romford for 1.5 miles and then left along Gubbins Lane for 0.5 mile to the station.

Today's 8.5 mile circular walk (with shorter option) goes through varied Green Belt countryside with long distance views towards Kent, parkland and part of the newly created Thames Chase woodland. Includes a visit to Warley Place Nature Reserve in the afternoon for Spring flowers. Bring lunch or pub food available. Details: (020) 8366 2242 or 07948 204 025. Leader: Dave Cockle

Wed 21 April. River Cray & Petts Wood (N.T.). Meet 10.59am at Bexley Station (10.34am Gravesend train from London Bridge Station – usually from platforms 1-3). Otherwise, travel on the 9.34am train from Enfield Chase and meet Martin at 10.06am on this train's terminating platform at Moorgate station for transfer by Northern Line to London Bridge. Today's 7.5 to 8 mile linear walk is based upon the London Loop ending at Petts Wood Station. Shorter options. Bring lunch or pub food available. Leader: Martin Langer

Sat 24 April. River Mimram & Tewin. Meet 10.34am Welwyn North Station (by ticket office) for 8 mile circular walk via Harmer Green, Tewin (lunch stop) and Mimram Valley. This area often has good bluebell displays in the woods. Bring lunch or pub food available. Option to end at lunchtime and return to start by bus. By train: 10.11am train from Finsbury Park or at 10.21am from Potters Bar Stations. By car: Welwyn North is near Digswell about 1 mile east of A1(M) (junction 6) or follow B1000 from Hertford. Leader: Christine Fookes

Bank Holiday Mon 3 May. Chiltern Commons, Woods & Chalk Valleys. Meet 10.37am Chorleywood Station by ticket office (10.00am Metropolitan Line train from Baker Street) for about 8 to 9 mile circular walk through pretty Chiltern scenery with bluebell woods. Bring lunch or pub food available. By car about 45 mins from Enfield via M25 (junction 18) & A404. Leader: Stuart Mills

Mon 10 May. From the City towards Westminster. Meet 10.30am Moorgate Station near ticket office (9.49am train from Enfield Chase) for a linear walk via Barbican, City gardens and then following the Thames with some less well known tourist sights. The full route will include a lunch break (bring lunch or food available) and finish by 4.00pm. Many shorter options. Leader: Brenda Brown

Sat 15 May. Chiltern Downland & Ivinghoe Beacon. Meet 10.30am at the main N.T. car park for Ivinghoe Beacon (located at grid ref: SP963160 on OS Landranger Map 165) which is about 0.5 mile from the Beacon on the lane connecting Ringshall to B489. No public transport. By car: either (i): M25 to junction 20, A41 to Tring North junction with B4009/B488. Then follow B488 towards Ivinghoe Village and just before village turn right onto B489 towards Dunstable. Then first right after 0.75 mile into Ringshall Lane; or (ii): A4146 northwards out of Hemel Hempstead town centre (signposted Leighton Buzzard) for 9 miles to B489 & left for 1.5 miles.

8 mile circular walk on chalk uplands and through beech woods via Bridgewater Monument, Grim's Ditch & Ivinghoe Beacon. Stunning views over Vale of Aylesbury. Moderately hilly in places but possible to shorten route. Bring lunch or pub food available in pretty village of Aldbury. Details: 07703 470 156. Leaders: Toby Simon & Margaret McAlpine

Wed 19 May. Enfield's Countryside. Meet 10.30am Crews Hill Station (10.21am train from Enfield Chase) for linear walk via Tingey Tops, Holly Hill Farm & Trent Park ending at Oakwood Station. Options to end earlier, including from lunch stop. Bring lunch or food available. Leader: Norman Coles

Railways

Railway Centenary Exhibition

April 4th 2010 will be the centenary of the Great Northern Railway extension from Grange Park to Cuffley. To commemorate the event T.E.S. members Dave Cockle, Roger Elkin and John Rowe, and Cuffley resident Peter Dace, have put together an exhibition of photographs and artefacts plotting the line's history and its effect on the local communities.

The line had been authorised by an act of parliament of 1898 with powers to construct through to Stevenage (Langley Junction), but the construction work did not start until 1906 due to financial constraints. Further financial difficulties and the First World War resulted in Cuffley becoming the temporary terminus of the line. It was not until 1924 that passenger trains began to run regularly beyond Cuffley to Hertford North.

The exhibition dates are as follows:

Cuffley Library, Maynard Place, Station Road, Cuffley – 6th to 16th April

Forty Hall – 28th April to 20th June

Due to space constraints at Cuffley Library, the display will be limited, with the main emphasis being on Cuffley. At Forty Hall more space is available and a wider range of exhibits will be on view covering the route up to Grange Park.

A commemorative plaque donated by Northaw & Cuffley Parish Council will be unveiled at Cuffley Station on 6th April and a similar plaque donated by The Enfield Society will be unveiled at Gordon Hill Station on 27th April.

An illustrated talk about the Grange Park to Cuffley railway extension will be given at Jubilee Hall on 15th April at 7.30 for 8 p.m.

Temple Church and Middle Temple Hall

The roof of the circular nave, built between 1160 and 1185, contains both Norman and Gothic elements.

Despite the wet weather on 15th September, a group from The Enfield Society had an interesting guided tour of the Temple Church and the Middle Temple Hall, followed by lunch, all very kindly arranged by Brian Pask. Although the hall, built between 1562 and 1570, can only be visited on pre-arranged tours, the church, built for the Knights Templar, is normally open on afternoons.

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Visit to Salisbury
