Helping to make our borough beautiful

The Enfield Society has recently given two grants for planting flowers to keep our borough looking attractive.

As part of the Enfield in Bloom scheme we sponsored the planting of a rose bed at the junction of Church Street and Victoria Road, Edmonton N9. As shown in the picture, it has not yet filled out, but the Enfield in Bloom coordinator. Mo Cross, says that by this time next

We have made a contribution to the cost of hanging baskets in Church Street, The Town and London Road, as part of a scheme organised by the Enfield Town Business Association and also supported by the Old Enfield Charitable Trust. The work of the Association is described in the article below.

The hanging baskets are being watered and maintained weekly by commercial contractors, but many of the flower beds in the borough depend on volunteers to look after them. It is sad when initial enthusiasm to set up a project is not carried through to its long-term maintenance. Enfield in Bloom have an urgent appeal on their web site at www.enfieldinbloom.org.uk for volunteer gardeners who can spend a few hours now and then. Both Enfield Town and Southbury stations have been set up with container planting by "Energy Gardens" and are now crying out for local volunteers to look after the plants. Our chairman, Dave Cockle, will liaise with anyone willing to help with station gardens.

Enfield Town, like many town centres throughout the country, is struggling with empty units resulting in many very tired and rundown vacant shopfronts along the high street.

Many household names have disappeared from our high streets recently, the latest casualty being Maplins in Church Street.

Due to reasons including government cutbacks, Enfield Council has failed to make investment in Enfield Town. For several years we have gone without hanging flower baskets during the summer and Christmas lights to brighten our Town centre during the festive season, when we need to make Enfield more inviting to the local community.

The Enfield Town Business Association, Chaired by Erdal Mehmet of G Mantella Jewellers, and Chris Theodoulou of Emma Claire Hair & Beauty Spa, have revitalized the business association.

They have worked hard to raise funds from local businesses around the Town which has enabled them to employ me, Mark Rudling, as a part time community Town Centre Manager. Apart from donations from smaller retailers, larger organizations who have offices around

the Town and share a genuine concern about its well-being have also given generous support. These businesses include Metaswitch, Kaybridge Construction and Winchmore Brickwork.

We are trying to fight back and make Enfield Town a more attractive place for the local community to visit, and for businesses to want to be in and more importantly, to invest in.

Funds have been raised for hanging baskets around Church Street and London Road from local businesses and community organizations. Special thanks go to the Enfield Society for their contribution to brightening up our Town.

Our next main objective is to have Christmas lights back after a break of several years. I fully appreciate that hanging baskets and festive lights won't instantly change the fortune of the area, but it all plays a part on the path to restoring our lovely Enfield Town to the jewel in the borough's crown that it once was and should be again.

Conservation and buildings

Conservation Advisory Group

The Council's Conservation Advisory Group (CAG) meets monthly to consider larger planning applications within the Borough's Conservation Areas and the Society is represented on that group. Views are developed within the Society's Architecture & Planning Group. CAG comments and recommendations are included in the report that is submitted to the Planning Committee. During the last three months there have been some interesting debates on the following projects -

New Metaswitch building on the Genotin Road car park. While some members may regret the loss of surface car parking, the proposed new office building will allow Metaswitch to expand in Enfield bringing new employment opportunities to the area. In addition to the discussion at CAG, an exhibition was held at the Dugdale Centre in June. The site was identified for development within the approved Enfield Town Plan and we have therefore concentrated on the design of the building rather than the use of the site. Metaswitch are proposing a high quality design and while we would like to see some improvements to the landscaping we consider that the scheme will be a positive addition to the Town. Enfield Council has recently established a 'Place and Design Quality Panel' where independent professionals review the design of major developments. The new Metaswitch building was the first development to undergo this process and we believe that it will help to raise the standard of new buildings in the Borough.

Trent Park. Members who study the Council's planning application weekly lists may be surprised by the number of applications relating to the Trent Park development. The master plan for the site has not changed and we are pleased to see that the landscaping proposals are all unchanged, but the developer, Berkley Homes has been carrying out a design review to many of the proposed properties. These changes require a variation to the planning approval but to a large extent we are satisfied that these changes improve the appearance of the houses and flats. We are keeping the matter under review.

Bike-hangers. As part of the Council's plans to encourage cycling in Enfield, they are providing secure on-street cycle parking shared by residents who request it. These 'bike-hangars' provide secure parking for up to six bikes and are designed to help those who have no storage facilities, for example those living in flats. They are located on the highway in place of a street car parking place. Local consultation is carried out with nearby residents before the hangers are provided. The Society has some concerns about their use within Conservation Areas and the Council has agreed to consult CAG before any are provided in sensitive locations.

Rose and Crown reopened




We are pleased to report that the closure was just for refurbishment and that the pub re-opened at noon on 23rd July.

Re-launch of the Edmonton Heritage Trail





If you live in Edmonton or the eastern part of the Borough you may have noticed changes to some of the information boards with new plans showing the Edmonton Heritage Trail. The Council, supported by the West Anglia Community Rail Partnership and the Enfield Society, has updated the Heritage trail providing a guide to historic buildings, sites of local interest and commemorative plaques. The trail commemorates people such as Gladys Aylward and Charles Lamb; notable buildings such as The Crescent and Edmonton Girls Charity School and several churches including St Alphege's Church, Hertford Road, recently listed as a Grade II historic building.

Edmonton has a rich and important history in the development of both the Borough and north London and the Society welcomes the re-launch of the trail. Leaflets are available in local libraries and Jubilee Hall and can be downloaded from

places to visit, famous people, how to identify trees, the history of the New River and local industries and more. The price is £6.

Unfortunately the Enfield Town and Country Show in the Town Park was cancelled after our order forms were printed but Waterstones bookshop in Church Street, Enfield, stocks all the books, heritage guides and maps. Christmas cards are usually on sale at Gray's Newsagents and the main post office.

The Enfield Town and Country Show 2018 is cancelled

The Enfield Society was sorry to learn that the Enfield Town and Country Show 2018 had been cancelled. The following explanation was posted on the Show's Facebook page by the organisers on 23rd June.

It is with a great deal of sadness that Quintessentially British Events/Classic Festivals and Events have decided to not go ahead with the Enfield Town Show 2018. This decision has not been taken lightly and from a personal point of view, out of all the shows we organise, The Enfield Town Show has always been one of my favourite shows. The Community spirit is exceptional, which is why I love the show and the people of Enfield and surrounding communities. It is something Enfield should be truly proud of. Everybody wants to be a part of the Town Show from the fabulous Community, Community Groups, Kathy Worrall who is truly passionate and Love Your Doorstep which is what made the show what it is. It has been an honour organising it. A lot of people are asking the reasons why it is not going ahead:

1) We have tried since February to speak to anybody more Senior than the Events Assistant from the Council about the situation when finding out on Facebook about the Balloon Festival and what they were offering. The Shows are almost identical apart from the Community aspect. To date NOBODY from the Council has bothered to come back to us.

- 2) We have a responsibility to our exhibitors. Although many people might feel 8 weeks between two shows in the same Park which have identical attractions is long enough for people to attend both, from bitter experience it is not. A lot of families also do not have the money to attend both. It would not be fair to take this risk for our exhibitors.
- 3) We have an email from four years ago stating when we took over the Enfield Town Show that they would not allow another similar large event to be held in the Park. This has quite clearly been ignored but because nobody from the Council would come back to us, we have not been able to discuss this.
- 4) Two years ago the Council introduced a per person fee on visitors coming to the show. So not only do we pay the Council to rent the land, we pay fee on every single person coming to the show including under 5's who come in for free. This has not been a problem for us due to the Town Shows popularity but it could be a problem should

the Balloon Festival have a detrimental effect on the Town Show.

5) We were contacted by the Council a couple of weeks ago to say, when we were attending the Council led Enfield Town Show meeting at the end of June (only couple of months before the event) to not apply for any licenses as nothing was yet confirmed which was unlike previous years which was extremely concerning for us.

We did not want to cancel the show and we are truly sorry as an Organiser that we have been put in this position as we have worked extremely hard on it for years. We would appreciate your understanding on this decision as this was the last measure we wanted to take as we have put our heart and soul into organising it for the last four years.

All exhibitors are in the process of being contacted and will be fully refunded.

August – no meetings

25th September. *Memories of Chase Farm. Part 1: The Schools* by Frank Bayford. Frank Bayford was Pharmacist at Chase Farm Hospital before retiring. In this talk Frank will describe how schools came to be established in the early days at the Chase Farm site and how the children were looked after. The talk will include anecdotes and reminiscences of people involved with the schools. Frank will talk about the schools in the first half of the talk and follow this with photographs.

30th October. The Golden Road to Samarkand, an illustrated talk by Stephen Gilburt. In the 7th century central Asia was conquered by Arabs and the people converted to Islam. In the late 14th century the area was ruled by Tamurlaine. By the late 16th century there were several independent Muslim Khanates. Cities such as Khiva, Bukara and Samarkand still have palaces, mosques with minarets, madrassas (Koranic teaching schools), bazaars and caravanserai (inns where merchants could stay while travelling on the Silk Road between China and eastern Mediterranean ports). These cities grew rich on the manufacture and trade in cotton and silk cloth, carpets, ceramics, artifacts made from metal and wood, and jewellery, which were transported in camel caravans along the Silk Road. Central Asia was conquered by Russia in the 19th century but since 1991 has been split up into independent republics such as Uzbekistan.

27th November. Finding Enfield's fallen by Martin Lambert. It is 100 years since the end of the Great War and yet there are still more clues to our past that history is giving up. Martin Lambert is a battlefield tour guide and has researched many of Enfield's war dead. In this talk Martin will tell us how we can look deeper into the information we have on our war dead and show us how we can learn about our own relations.

11th December. *Dickens and Christmas* by Dr Tony Williams, plus post-talk quiz and mince pies.

Chairmans' column

We were recently concerned to see the deteriorating condition of the Grade II listed "Rose and Crown" public house in Clay Hill. The windows were boarded up and fly tipping had occurred in the car park to the rear. Additionally, there were signs of break-ins to out-buildings with their contents strewn about the car park. The site bore the appearance of abandoned premises complete with the presence of dead plants in the hanging baskets. A search on social media sites indicated that the pub was closed for several months for refurbishment. Despite several rumours, there was no formal notification on site indicative of its permanent closure.

The Society raised its concern with the Council on the lack of security of the site and consequently some welcome changes occurred. The shutters came off the windows, the fly tipping debris was cleared up and the hanging baskets were re-planted. Furthermore, the building became lived-in whilst the refurbishment work took place. Best news of all is that the pub reopened on 23rd July.

I was saddened to learn about the Town Show being abandoned this year, having many happy memories of the annual event going back to the 1960's. We scouts set up a "model" camp as part of the show. Canoeing demonstrations were given on the New River, jam tarts cooked in an improvised wood fuelled

"oil drum" oven were sold along with a mug of tea for six old pence! In this pre-mobile 'phone age we

'phone age we scouts were used as "runners", taking messages to and from the PA tent. The show was very much a community event presenting an opportunity for local clubs and societies to show-case activities. At least one step has consequently been taken to mitigate the loss of the show: the horticultural events are to take place at Salisbury House, Bury Street West, on 22nd and 23rd September.

The recent hot weather has resulted in low water level in the New River, Town Loop. Consequently, there is a noticeably bad smell by the riverside. At the beginning of July some dead fish were seen floating in the water as result of a pollution incident which is currently being investigated jointly by the Council and the Environment Agency. We have asked the Council to let us know the findings of this investigation.

In closing, I would like to thank those TES members who responded to our plea, in our Summer News, for more volunteers. We are planning to attend the Palmers Green Show on Sunday 2nd September and the presence of extra volunteers makes it much easier to staff our stall.

Historic buildings: Broomfield


Broomfield House, Palmers Green

"Hidden Treasures – revealing Broomfield House and Park" is an interesting exhibition which may be seen at the Dugdale Centre, Enfield town, until 6th January 2019. It has been curated by Stacey Anne Bagdi, from the Museum of Enfield, and the Broomfield House Trust. The exhibition contains prints, photographs, maps, paintings and artifacts from when the house was lived in and from when it was a museum. Views and objects connected with some of the various activities which have taken place in the house and park will bring back many memories.

Named after John Broomfield, Broomfield House was originally a two-storey timber-framed 16th century farmhouse with two or three rooms on each floor. Later in the 16th century it was extended at the northern end with a timber-framed gabled wing over a brick basement and two chimneys were inserted. The house was later owned in turn by Geoffrey Walkaden and Richard Skevington. In the early 17th century it was occupied by Alderman Sir John Spencer, who sold it to Joseph Jackson. Further timber-framed additions were constructed to the south-west and north in the 17th century. By 1624 the house was recorded as having 14 hearths. In the 18th century a brick service wing containing a kitchen, pantry and scullery was added to the south-east. This 1800 watercolour shows the many gabled west front of Broomfield House, which then had a U-shaped plan. There will be a free talk on the early history of Broomfield by Ivor Evans at 1pm on Tuesday 13th November in the Dugdale Centre.



In the early 18th century a fine baroque oak staircase with an ornate balustrade was inserted at Broomfield House. In 1726 the walls and ceiling of the staircase hall were covered with classical mythological paintings by the Flemish artist Gerard Lanscroon. Other murals by Lanscroon can still be seen at nearby Arnos Grove House (now Southgate House), Southgate Green. The ceiling painting at Broomfield showed a female figure holding a carpenter's plane, which may refer to the origins of the Jackson family's wealth. On the wall to the right were four female figures representing the seasons. On the left wall Mercury, messenger of the gods with a winged helmet, was shown kneeling before Cupid. Behind Cupid were his mother, Venus, goddess of love, and father, the craftsman Vulcan, god of fire. Above was Minerva, with an owl behind her symbolising her wisdom.





The murals were damaged by fire in 1984 and the surviving fragments are now held in store by Enfield Council. The head illustrated is that of Minerva. The whole figure of Minerva has now been conserved with a grant from the Enfield Society and an anonymous donations. It is one of the highlights of the exhibition. Examples of the three designs of baluster and a partial reconstruction of the staircase are also on display.

There will be a talk on the Lanscroon murals by Dr Mark Banting at 2pm on Tuesday 11th September in the Dugdale Centre, admission £3.

Historic buildings: Broomfield



The Jackson family held the estate for nearly 200 years until Mary Jackson married William Tash. At his death in 1816 Broomfield was bequeathed to Henry and Louisa Powys. About 1820 the north end of the house was demolished and rebuilt in brick with two large reception rooms on the ground floor. The roof was rebuilt, the gables were removed and the courtyard was filled in to give a nearly rectangular shape to the plan of the house.

The Powys family remained owners until 1903, although the house was let to tenants including William Rathbone, a deputy of the Corporation of London, who lived at Broomfield House from 1858.



Between 1875 and 1901 the tenant was Sir Ralph Littler. He became a barrister in 1857 and a QC in 1877, specialising in promoting railway bills. From 1875 he led the campaign to separate Southgate, which included Winchmore Hill and Palmers Green, from the Edmonton Board of Health. Despite opposition from Edmonton and from some people in Southgate expressed at public meetings, he succeeded in getting a separation bill passed by Parliament. A new Southgate Board of Health was established in 1881. Southgate subsequently became an urban district in 1894 and a municipal borough in 1933. These photographs show the drawing room and staircase hall at Broomfield House during Sir Ralph Littler's occupation.



In 1903 most of the estate was sold for housing but Southgate Urban District Council purchased the house and 54 acres of grounds for a public park at a cost of £25,000. The house was used by Southgate County School between 1907 and 1910. A maternity centre was opened on the first floor in 1917 and a dental clinic in 1929. This view shows the west front as it appeared before 1928.



The park has been used for a variety of activities including running, football, tennis, netball, swimming and sailing model boats. Here a group of Chelsea Pensioners are shown enjoying a game of bowls in the 1920s.



Between 1928 and 1932 Southgate Urban District Council removed the existing roughcast and covered the exterior of the house with mock-Tudor timberwork. The north wing, rebuilt in brick in the early 19th century, was not refaced. The house was listed Grade II in 1950 and was upgraded to II* in 1971. The park is also listed. This view shows the west front of the house as it appeared up to 1984.



Broomfield Museum opened on the ground floor in 1925. After wartime use by the RAMC, the museum re-opened in 1949 with a cafe on the ground floor and a health centre on the first floor. The permanent museum collection included stuffed animals and birds, a glass-sided beehive and fossils. There were also various temporary exhibitions, often on local subjects such as Sir Thomas Lipton and the Cresswells. The Dugdale Centre exhibition includes mounted butterflies and a stuffed fox from the Broomfield Museum collection.

Historic buildings: Broomfield



In 1984 the top floor and roof of Broomfield House were destroyed by a fire caused by an electrical fault. The structure was further damaged by arson attacks in 1993 and 1994. The remaining part of the building is now supported by scaffolding and covered with sheeting to try to protect the ruin from further damage. In 2003 the house featured in the BBC television series *Restoration*. Various proposals for restoring and bringing the house back into use have been made. The plans have included a banqueting hall, a theatre, a public house/restaurant and sheltered housing between the house and the stable block. However not one of these plans has been carried out.

Visitors to Broomfield Park today can enjoy various activities and see the ponds and the flower beds as well as the listed Garden House, Stable Block and walls dating from the 16th to the 18th centuries.

Broomfield Park Conservatory

The Broomfield Park Conservatory is tucked away next to the upper lake. It lies within the walled area of the park close to Broomfield House. Its appearance is Victorian with the typical brick and timber frame construction of that period and fish-scale glazing. In fact it was not built until 1934. It was built on behalf of Southgate Borough Council by Messrs W Richardson of Darlington at a cost of £912. Even then the Council were short of funds and took out a loan from the Ministry of Health which was repaid over 20 years.

According to a report in the Palmers Green and Southgate Gazette it opened to the public in October with a wonderful display of chrysanthemums. It was, subsequently, used to bring on bedding plants which could be used in the park. Eventually, the number of gardeners was reduced and the council started to buy in plants. When I first remember the conservatory in the early 1980s it was packed with exotic and ornamental plants for the visitor to admire and was open on a daily basis.

Unfortunately, the conservatory fell on hard times in the late 1990s. The fabric of the building suffered and as is often the case with neglected buildings it became subject to vandalism. It was finally closed to the public, on safety grounds in August 2003.

At the end of 2009 the Council commissioned a major refurbishment of the conservatory which was completed in February 2010. The glass was replaced with polycarbonate to reduce the risk of future vandalism. The Council did not have

the funds so the running of the conservatory was given over to the Friends of Broomfield Park. A group of volunteers set about making it a safe and attractive place again. There are deep rainwater collection tanks with an electric pump and an automatic watering system, while fans have been added to increase ventilation.

The stock of interesting sub-tropical plants, such as orchids, cacti, succulents and carnivorous plants has

been increased over the years. The banana plant has been reintroduced and is bearing fruit this summer. One of the plants to survive during the years of neglect was the *Strelitzia* and this has become the signature flower. After the refurbishment the

conservatory was secured behind a chain link fence. This temporary measure was still in place in 2015. It was decided to track down the railings which were, originally, around the toilets on the Palmers Green Triangle. With the help of a local blacksmith the railings



were refurbished, made safe and installed in a low brick wall. The original metal gates to the toilets were adapted to allow access. A grant from the Enfield Society made this all possible. The appearance of the conservatory has been much enhanced.



In 2016 there was concern that the fabric of the conservatory was deteriorating once more. Fortunately, in November 2017, the principal surveyor for Enfield Council authorised a full refurbishment of the conservatory. This was completed in June 2018 and thanks to new paint technology the conservatory's future is looking bright. The volunteers organise a number of events throughout the year including children's workshops, craft events, plant information talks, musical interludes and a

variety of plant sales. The conservatory is open to the public every Wednesday and Sunday afternoon.

Footpaths

Pymmes Brook Trail relaunched



Back in the 1990s, a muchmissed organisation called the London Walking Forum encouraged boroughs around London to come up with

ideas for new walking routes. Sadly, the Forum no longer exists, leaving a cavernous hole in the promotion of walking in the capital, and many of the routes that were developed then have sunk into obscurity.

But one of them, the Pymmes Brook Trail, is to be relaunched in October. Created as a combined initiative of the London Boroughs of Barnet and Enfield, it originally ran for 10 miles across northeast London from Cockfosters Station to Picketts Lock on the Lee Navigation, and naturally followed as closely as possible Pymmes Brook, a tributary of the River Lea.

The relaunch is accompanied by a new and colourfully-illustrated 112-page guide to the route by Colin Saunders, whose guides to the Capital Ring, London Loop, North Downs Way and Vanguard Way are familiar to many ramblers. The book describes a more logical 13-mile route that starts at Hadley Green, where the headwaters of Pymmes Brook rise, near the site of the Battle of Barnet, fought during the Wars of the Roses, and descends gently through East Barnet, Osidge, Palmers Green and Edmonton to finish at Tottenham Hale, where the brook flows into the River Lea.

The route is surprisingly green in such an urban area, passing through Monken Hadley Common, Oak Hill Park, Brunswick Park, Arnos Park, Broomfield Park, Bowes Meadow, Millfield, Pymmes Park and Tottenham Marshes, taking advantage of several new brookside stretches that have been made accessible in recent years. One of London's least well-known beauty spots, Jack's Lake, features early in the route, which also passes many places of historical and cultural interest, all described in the

Links with stations at High Barnet, New Barnet, Cockfosters, Arnos Grove, Palmers Green, Silver Street, Northumberland Park and Tottenham Hale, together with excellent bus connections, allow walkers to split the route into as many sections as they want, and there are many opportunities for refreshment.

The relaunch will start with a walk on Saturday 27th October along the first half of the route from High Barnet to Arnos Grove station, followed by another on Sunday 28th October from Arnos Grove station to Tottenham Hale.

Tues 21 Aug. North-East from Bayford. Meet 10.12 Bayford Station (09.59 train from Enfield Chase but CHECK close to date in case Great Northern have a timetable change). Car drivers can meet group at 10.25 near Farmer's Boy in Brickendon Green — please park considerately and NOT in pub car park.

7.5 to 8 mile circular walk on tracks, minor lanes and field paths through pretty countryside and nature reserves. Lunch stop in Hertford Heath (bring lunch or pub food available) from where possible to finish by using bus to either Hertford or Broxbourne (but NOT back to Bayford). Leader: Mick Spinks

Wed 12 Sept. Bulbourne Valley. Meet 10.50 Hemel Hempstead Station (10.24 West Midlands Trains Milton Keynes service from London Euston mainline station – usually platform 9).

Merryhills Way footpath

- status still not yet quite settled

The Merryhills Way leads from Fairview Road, off the Ridgeway, to Trent Park, with link paths providing access from Trentwood Side and from Enfield Road near the Jolly Farmers.

In our Winter 2017 issue we reported that Enfield Council had published a notice in September 2017 dedicating these footpaths as public rights of way, with immediate effect. It now appears that it is not quite as cut and dried as we had thought, and there are a few loose ends to be tidied up. Three further notices were published on 11th July 2018. Dominic Millen, the Council Officer responsible for footpaths has explained the situation as follows:

"Enfield Council published a notice of their intention to recognise the main eastwest section of the Merryhills Way footpath. This alignment was agreed with the landowner after negotiations involving the Western Enfield Residents Association.

Following clarification of alignment and land ownership queries, the Council has now published the notice which confirms these paths along with two others relating to the confirmation of separate link paths.

These separate link paths provide access from Enfield Road and Fairview Road to the main east-west route. Assuming there are no objections to these notices, the Council will move to recognise all of the paths in the next few months. This will include adding them to the online public right of way map and highway records."

Following on from the successful launch of the Local Heritage List (see our Spring 2018 newsletter) we are now looking for volunteers to do a yearly check of the listed buildings. This would involve the volunteers going around their chosen area once a year and checking on the state of the locally listed buildings and if possible the statutory listed ones too. The results of this survey should then be reported back to TES Heritage at Risk group who would liaise with the Council.

Having achieved an extremely good Local Heritage list we are concerned the it should be regularly followed up and updated so this is an important task.
